### June Presentation - Bob Cotgrove



Urban geographer Bob Cotgrove provided an expert's view of the reasons, and possible solutions, for the increasing traffic congestion in Hobart. Bob explained that the geography of Hobart currently forced most traffic flowing from one area of the city to another, through the city centre. The layout of the city centre has changed little in the past one hundred and fifty years. There is an ever increasing ownership and use of cars resulting in the congestion we see today.

Bob advocated the need to provide an option to bypass the CBD. This is an expensive project and not supported by many politicians.

# CONSTRUCTION OF THE NEW BRIDGEWATER BRIDGE

The new Bridgewater Bridge is Tasmania's largest ever transport infrastructure project. The new bridge will make travel safer and more efficient. It will connect local communities, create more open space and change the way people travel between the north and south of the state. Construction company McConnell Dowell is the lead contractor for the project, which will be completed next year.

Sam Green is a project engineer with McConnell

Dowell. He is Tasmanian born and bred, from Hobart. He studied Ocean Engineering at the Australian Maritime College in Launceston before moving to the mainland and pursuing works all around Australia, Fiji and PNG. Most recently he worked on a new wharf construction for the Australian Navy in Darwin with McConnell Dowell, before returning home in February 2023 to work on the new Bridgewater Bridge.


# Monday & Thursday Walkers (Ian Miller 0407 686 447)
