May Presentation - Di Mason

DI MASON:- MELANOMA INSTITUTE OF AUSTRALIA



Di Mason provided an interesting and insightful outline of why Australia has the dubious title of "melanoma capital" of the world. She commenced by explaining how ultra violet light penetrates and damages successive layers of our skin and the resulting evolution of traumas, starting with basal cell carcinoma, progressing through squamous cell carcinoma to the deadly melanoma.

She explained that most skin damage occurs in childhood, so the stage is already set for most of us.

Di also dispelled many widely held beliefs, including;

- If you have a good tan you are protected. (Tan is actually damaged skin).
- You don't have to worry about UV on a cloudy day (95% of UV radiation passes through clouds)
 - It's a hot climate problem, (Tasmania is second behind Queensland for melanomas)

The big message Di delivered is:

"Early detection is vital for melanoma survival. If there is any unusual change to your skin, anywhere on your body, get it checked by a specialist as soon as you can".

Bob was a lecturer at the University of Tasmania, teaching from 1970 until 2012.

New Presentation Manager - GEORGE STRICKLAND




George Strickland has agreed to take on the valuable role of Presentation Manager.

Cost: \$50 per head (Drinks at own expense)


Method of payment will be provided at the June meeting.


